## a note from Susan



Dear Reader,

For as long as I can remember, my Mama told me about my great-grandmother Cassie who prayed for the generations to come. She died before I was born, so I didn't know her, but something about the idea of this generational prayer gave me a sense of rootedness.

I always went to church but did not know Jesus as my Savior until I was twenty-three. As I grew in the grace and knowledge of Jesus, I kept thinking about this woman who prayed for me before I was born. As I began to understand a covenantal perspective of Scripture and of life, I saw the scope and beauty of generational praying as the overflow of that theology.

Our three children were in their pre-teen/teen years when my friend Barbara Thompson told me about a woman asking her to pray for her son's behavior. Barbara responded, "I won't pray about his behavior, but I will pray for his heart." And Barbara told her a scripture she would pray for him. I was immediately convicted because I, too, prayed about the behavior of our children, my husband, and our church. In essence, I gave God a to-do list of how I wanted Him to change them.

I searched the Bible for a passage to pray and landed on Paul's prayer in Ephesians 3. The more I prayed God's Word, the deeper it went into my own heart. The scope of it excited and challenged me, and I began praying it for the generations to come. My imagination soared as I thought about my prayers mingling with the prayers of my great-grandmother.

Over time I added other scriptures, and gradually God’s Word shaped my prayer life. As I prayed God’s Word back to Him, I came to know Him better.

As each grandchild was born, I could say with Hannah, “For this child I prayed” (1 Sam. 1:27). As some of the grandchildren have married, I can say to their beloved—“I have prayed for you since this grandchild was born.” Now I am telling my great-grandchildren that I prayed Hannah’s prayer for them.

Recently Sara, a granddaughter-in-love, sent me the following text:

“We had a great sermon this morning. The pastor briefly mentioned Deuteronomy 6:10-11.”

And when the LORD your God brings you into the land that he swore to your fathers, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, to give you—with great and good cities that you did not build, and houses full of all good things that you did not fill, and cisterns that you did not dig, and vineyards and olive trees that you did not plant—and when you eat and are full, then take care lest you forget the LORD, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.  
– DEUTERONOMY 6:10-11

“This is what it felt like marrying into your family. I’m thankful I drink from cisterns I did not dig and eat from vineyards I did not plant.”

Sara shared this at one of our family gatherings as my children, grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren in highchairs, sat around our table. Then I asked them:

- What cisterns are you drinking from that you did not dig?
- What cisterns are you digging for these two great-grandchildren?

It was a sweet and lively discussion. It was also a poignant discussion because the mother of one of the great-grand babies is named Cassie. I reminded them of the cistern of prayer that great-grandmother Cassie dug. This woman lived in the 1800s. It is likely she never traveled more than a few miles from her home, yet she had an eternal perspective. At some level she understood that Jesus writes big, long, redemptive stories that extend from eternity past to eternity future, and she was part of that story. So were the generations to come, and she prayed for us. I’m grateful for her prayers, but there is one thing I think about a lot. I wonder what she prayed. It would be a treasure to have her prayer journal, which prompted me to record some of the scriptures I pray so the generations to come will know what I prayed for them.

I hope you will do the same. Parenting would be terrifying apart from the presence and promises of God. He has given us great and precious promises.

And I will establish my covenant between me and you and your offspring after you throughout their generations for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. – GENESIS 17:7

And if you are Christ’s, then you are Abraham’s offspring, heirs according to promise. – GALATIANS 3:29

I encourage you to pray beyond your own family and to pray for your extended family and your church family.

As we pray for grace to live in the reality of His presence, and as we pray His Word for our children and the generations to come, we are transformed by His Word and Spirit more and more into His likeness.

# prayers for what we carry

When they ask me to pray for specific needs such as a job, I tell them I do not know what is best for them so I will pray  
Matthew 6:10:

Father, Your will be done and Your kingdom come in \_\_\_\_\_'s heart as it is in heaven.

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When they are suffering:

Father, please strengthen \_\_\_\_\_ with all power, according to Your glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy; giving thanks to You for qualifying them to share in the inheritance of the saints in light (Col. 1:11-12). Give them grace to remember that You work all things together for our good and Your glory (Rom. 8:28).

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When they are reviled, I pray 1 Peter 2:23:

Give \_\_\_\_\_ Your strength to respond like Jesus. "When he was reviled, he did not revile in return, when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly."

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# covenant shaped prayers

- Each year select a passage to pray for your children.
- If you don't have children, consider praying for children of a single mom in your church family. Tell her you are praying for them.
- Select a passage to pray for a prodigal child in your church family and share it with the parents.
- Sunday school classes and small groups can divide the names of children and youth and pray for them. Also include children of missionaries supported by your church.
